

The Bay Area Teacher Development Collaborative Summer Institute

Global Questions, Classroom Connections

June 14 and 15, 2005

Stanford University

In partnership with the Stanford Program on International and Cross-cultural Education (SPICE) and Head-Royce School, the Bay Area Teacher Development Collaborative will sponsor a two-day conference on June 14 and 15 on the Stanford University campus. This exceptional event will bring together local independent school teachers and administrators and expert scholars and presenters for two days of conversation and study.

In exploring issues of international security and global development during this conference, we will focus upon four geographic areas: Northeast Asia, the Middle East, Africa, and Latin America. In addition, we will hear from renowned scholars from the Stanford Institute for International Studies about the latest news and developments on issues such as the nuclear crisis on the Korean Peninsula, bio-engineered food, and the humanitarian crisis in Darfur. We will meet in small discussion groups, jointly led by SPICE curriculum developers and seasoned social studies teachers, to share our experiences in teaching from a global perspective. There will be many opportunities to delve deeply into specific topics, learn about curricula that SPICE has developed, and be introduced to a wide variety of organizations and resources available to local educators. This conference, one full year in the planning, is geared specifically to middle and high school teachers in local independent schools. It will afford a special opportunity for participants to make connections with fellow educators and scholars, and to lay the groundwork for possible collaboration in the future.

For almost 30 years, SPICE has served as a link between research and teaching at Stanford and K-14 schools by providing exceptional professional development opportunities and curriculum materials on international and cross-cultural topics. SPICE is a program of the Stanford Institute for International Studies (SIIS), an interdisciplinary center at Stanford University that conducts research on key international issues related to security, political economy, the environment, and health policy. SPICE serves as a bridge between SIIS and schools, taking an interdisciplinary approach in addressing a diverse range of topics. SPICE has produced over 100 supplementary units that model effective teaching and learning. As with other summer institutes, there will be an optional Fellows Program for those who wish to continue their study during the 2005-2006 academic year. This program will involve four full days of learning and sharing and will explore forming a long-term network of global educators.
